For the right to an education. Let us pray for migrants, refugees and those affected by war, that their right to an education, which is necessary to build a better world, might always be respected. at home and abroad. Their commitment is seen in the contributions they have made as teachers and administrators in schools and colleges, some spending their whole lives serving in the same place. The sight and story of people coming, often a great distance, to honour their former educators is a joy to behold and a cause of celebration for all concerned.

Pope Francis singles out the plight of education in situations around the world where war is being waged. Here education is often the first casualty of armed conflict. The spectacle of seeing schools shut down and even destroyed as armed forces attack population centres is a horror shown too often on our screens. In some situations education is eroded, even ended on the grounds of gender, geography and greed. The common good is undermined when the right to education is usurped. Pope Francis underlines this in stating that education 'is necessary to build a better world'.

Peace is both the fruit of education and a fertile ground for its flourishing among and between peoples. We pray that the 'right to an education' be extended and exercised by every nation.
